THE TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT, INCORPORATING THE DIRECTORS' REPORT

FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2020

The directors present their report and the financial statements of the company for the financial year ended 31 August 2020.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES AND BUSINESS REVIEW

The principal activity of the company during the year was the activity of the National Scout Centre at Castle Saunderson.

The Board of Directors have considered the results for the year and the financial position at year end. Whilst the Board of Directors recognise that the National Scout Centre is still in its establishment phase, it has identified changes it wishes to make in the 2020/21 financial year which will upon implementation improve financial performance.

RESULTS

The Income and Expenditure Account and Statement of Financial Position for the year ended 31 August 2020 are set out on pages 8 and 9.

The deficit for the year amounted to €96,225 compared to a deficit of €74,303 in the previous year.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

Following a review of its activities the company has resolved that it should transfer its operations to a related party, Scouting Ireland CLG and is working closely with the board of directors of that company towards this outcome.

PRINCIPAL RISK AND UNCERTAINTIES

The principal risk is Covid-19 as it has significantly impacted the ability of the company to carry out its normal operations, and hence impacted profitability and cashflow. In order to mitigate these risks and to play its part in combatting the pandemic the Company has entered into a lease with the Health Service Executive for the use of the facility as a Covid-19 testing centre for a 12 month period. Management continues to monitor and assess risks and will respond accordingly.

HEALTH AND SAFETY

It is the policy of the company to ensure the health and welfare of employees by maintaining a safe working environment and place of work.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

Due to the nature of the company, it did not engage in any research or development during the year ended 31 August 2020.

EVENTS SINCE THE END OF THE FINANCIAL YEAR

Following from negotiations between Scouting Ireland Campsites and Facilities CLG and the Health Service Executive, a new Coronavirus Testing Centre is being set up at Castle Saunderson International Scout Centre which will now serve the wider community of Cavan and the North East. The Board wish to thank both Coillte and Cavan County Council for their assistance in establishing this new testing Centre. As a result of this agreement, from 1st April 2021, the centre will be closed for the duration of the pandemic. The use of our Scout Centre as a central hub to support combatting this pandemic is central to what Scouting is about. Throughout the pandemic, Scouts all over the country have stepped up to help their communities, and the Board are delighted to play their part in the national fight against the pandemic and to facilitate the new COVID testing site at Scouting Ireland's Castle Saunderson International Scout Centre.

DIRECTORS

The company is limited by guarantee and does not have a share capital.

GOING CONCERN

The Covid-19 pandemic has significantly impacted the ability of the company to carry out its normal operations which has negatively impacted its profitability and cashflows. Cash flow forecasts have been prepared by management which include the income from the lease with the Health Service Executive which indicate that the Company is expected to have sufficient cash flows to meet its obligations for a period of at least 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements. After considering the circumstances outlined above and the cashflow forecasts, the directors have a reasonable expectation, based on its present liquidity position, that the Company has adequate resources to meet its commitments over the next 12 months from the approval of these financial statements. Accordingly, the Directors continue to adopt the going concern basis of preparation in the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2020.

ACCOUNTING RECORDS

The measures taken by the directors to secure compliance with the requirements of Sections 281 to 285 of the Companies Act, 2014, with regard to the keeping of accounting records, are the employment of appropriately qualified accounting personnel and the maintenance of computerised accounting systems. The company's accounting records are maintained at the company's registered office at Larch Hill, Tibrabben, Dublin 16.





Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Scouting Ireland Campsites and Facilities CLG, which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Statement of Financial Position, the Statement of Cash Flows for the financial year ended 31 August 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

The financial reporting framework that has been applied in the preparation of the financial statements is Irish law and accounting standards issued by the Financial Reporting Council including FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'(Generally Accepted Accounting Practice in Ireland).





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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland and Irish statute comprising of the Companies Act, 2014.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgment in applying the company's accounting policies (see note 2).

In preparing the financial statements, the Company has referred to guidance included within FRS 102 and the Companies Act, 2014.

Going concern

The Covid-19 pandemic has significantly impacted the ability of the company to carry out its normal operations which has negatively impacted its profitability and cashflows.

Cash flow forecasts have been prepared by management which indicate that the Company is expected to have sufficient cash flows to meet its obligations for a period of at least 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements subject to any further the impact of Covid-19. Given the continuous uncertainties surrounding the duration of the pandemic, the length of the disruption to the leisure sector and its recovery speed, the directors acknowledge that the cash flow forecast is inherently uncertain in nature and that the actual cash flows may vary significantly from the forecast.

After considering the circumstances outlined above, cashflow forecasts and evaluation of various outcomes as a result of changes in demand and increases in operating costs, as a consequence of Covid-19, as well as the financial impact of potential mitigating actions that may be necessary, the directors have a reasonable expectation, based on its present liquidity position, that the Company has adequate resources to meet its commitments over the next 12 months from the approval of these financial statements. Accordingly, the Directors continue to adopt the going concern basis of preparation in the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2020.

Incoming resource

Donations are accounted for on a cash receipts basis.

National Scout Centre income and other income sources are recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants receivable

Revenue based grants receivable are accounted for in the Income and Expenditure Statement when the company's entitlement becomes legally enforceable and the related expenditure has been incurred.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is charged in order to write off the assets over their expected useful lives at the following rates:

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Volunteers and donated services and facilities

The value of services provided by volunteers is not incorporated into these financial statements.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised when a liability is incurred. Contractual arrangements are recognised as goods or services are supplied.

Irrecoverable VAT

All resources expended are classified under activity headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. As VAT is irrecoverable, it is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred.

Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities, including bank loans, are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value. In the Statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents are shown net of bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the company's cash management.

Financial Instruments

The company only enters into basic financial instruments transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other accounts receivable and payable, loans from banks and other third parties, loans to related parties and investments in non-puttable ordinary shares.

2. Judgements in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

When preparing the financial statements, management undertakes a number of judgements, estimates and assumptions about the recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenditure.

3. Analysis of turnover

All income was generated at our National Scout Centre in Castle Saunderson which is located in the Republic of Ireland.
